

A key feature might be the school's new maypole - but all ideas are welcome.


A discussion/ planning meeting is fixed for 7.30 pm on Thursday 12 January at the school. All are invited.

PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE

The Revd Marie Thorne explains how St Mary's is looking ahead

The New Year is a good time to look at what lies ahead and to plan a route forward into the future. That is what Wrawby Parochial Church Council will be doing in January.

In the light of guidelines received from the Bishop of Lincoln last summer we will be looking at how we, as part of the Christian community, can ensure the security and development of "a growing, worshipping, celebrating, proclaiming and caring Christian presence" in Wrawby.

We will begin the process in two stages. Firstly, at the January P.C.C. meeting, we will begin by looking where we are now with the help of the Revd John Cole, St Hugh's Missioner for the Diocese, who also lives in Wrawby.

The second stage will take the form of a half day at Great Limber, on Sunday 22 January, when we will being to look at possible strategies. We

This year, now that we all know about the competition, we might all put in a little bit of effort - and perhaps then we might win it. Wrawby has done it before!*





The Arts and Crafts group will meet on Monday 16 January at 2.0 pm.





Following the item in the November issue about the request for a speed reduction on Barton Road, Mr Stephen Caldwell,

Councillor Dick Long and I went to Beverley on 25th November to meet the Highways and Transportation Sub-Committee of the County Council.

Mr Caldwell had put together a presentation package for each Councillor which we had forwarded before the meeting.

At the meeting there were eight petitions to be presented. We were seventh on the agenda. For each petition there could be a delegation of three people, one of whom was able to speak. Mr Caldwell was going to be our spokesperson.

We sat through six petitions. In each case their spokesperson was asked to make their case. When it came to our turn, to our amazement, we were not even asked to speak. The Committee just recommended

our petition for approval. Mr Caldwell simply thanked them all for their support.

We are all shocked and amazed at the outcome because the night before the meeting there had been an article in the Evening Telegraph that appeared to be preparing us for a refusal.




