From this month times of service at the Church of the Ascension, Melton Ross, will fall into a new pattern and will normally be taken by the Vicar of the Great Limber group of parishes, the Revd Stephen Phillips.

The new pattern of services consists of Communion services on the first Sunday each month at 11.0 am and on the <u>third</u> and fifth Sundays at 9.30 am. Please note these new times. Exceptionally, the service on 1st November will be Mattins, as Stephen Phillips is not available that day.

This magazine will continue to be circulated in Melton Ross for one more issue (December). News of activities in the parish will be published thereafter in material circulated within the Great Limber group. The Revd Stephen Phillips is now the point of contact for Melton Ross folk on all pastoral matters, including baptisms, weddings and funerals. 
Wrawby/Brigg link-up a step nearer





Do you want to know more?

A small group has been meeting informally each month on a Thursday evening for the last few months at the home of the Revd John Cole - Pelham House in Little Lane - to study and discuss different aspects of what it means to be a disciple of Jesus Christ.

The nature of the group doesn't mean that you have got to be either very learned or very committed to going to church! So even if you harbour a lot of doubts about Christianity and what it might mean in your life, you could well still enjoy it. Above all the group won't make you feel guilty. Churches have for too long spent their *time* trying to bully people to respond to God (in a churchy way, of course!), not noticing how close God already is to people even in their doubts.

During the last few months we have been trying to understand prayer better. Now we are beginning to look at how people have gradually got rid of all sorts of mistaken notions about God - going right back to the Old Testament - *not* so that we can now say "We understand God", but so that we can be that much more aware that he is present with us *even* when we are not paying any attention



Learning to be good parents

Val Whitaker describes a recent 'Parenting' seminar she attended in Lincoln.

"The criticism we give our children often does more damage than the behaviour we are trying to correct"

This seminar was held at St Benedict's in Lincoln and was led by Michael Quinn, a very down to earth and likeable Irishman. He is the director of the charity `Family Caring', a man with great interest and enthusiasm to care for and preserve family life.

Michael and his wife have five children and have written a series of programmes designed to cover eight two-hour workshops to help parents function more effectively. These are already being set up by school, church and community groups throughout Britain and Ireland.

Michael led us through the format of his first seminar looking at practical skills to help us and our children survive and *even* enjoy our 'parenting'. So many of us have undertaken this job, and yet at times it seems to cause us much pain and suffering. It makes sense that by sharing our feelings of despair and frustration - and those of joy and reward! - we can analyse the situations we all find ourselves locked in, and can unravel these to improve the level of communication within our families.

One brief session was sufficient to allow me to see more clearly the mistakes I make daily, and also to see some simple steps I could take to modify my behaviour and make life better for all of us.

Michael encouraged us w consider starting groups of 8-10 parents to discuss these problems. His charity has prepared all the ground work in the form of a kit with cassette tapes and handbooks. These groups are meant to be led by interested parents, not experts, and it was suggested that once one had completed a course, some participants would feel inspired and ready to lead another group.

Topics explored by the group include

Misbehaviour - what is your child really looking for?

The responsible parent

Encouragement

Listening

Communicating about parents

Disciplining children

Space for each to develop at their own pace.


The day was challenging and encouraging. Somehow *we* never expect much help with the task of being a parent; we often allow ourselves to feel discouraged or a failure, when we are really doing quite a good job.








Deanery Picnic





The drama group performed a short sketch with everyone else being made to join in! Music groups led some choruses, and the collage and paintings were put on display.


Young and old had lots of fun and made new friends. We hope Cynthia Bunch and her team of organisers will share our feeling that it is worth repeating another year.

COMMENT

Follow the Saints

This month's title is not some enticement to support a certain football or rugby team. It is simply a request to look again at the example of the Christian men and women who have become known as Saints.

November 1st is 'All Saints Day', when the Church remembers those many Saints who do not have their own special day, or whose names are not even recalled at all.

Many of these people were 'ordinary' men and women, whose faith meant to much to them that they were prepared to die rather than to renounce it.

In my studies to be a Lay Reader, this term's work involves looking at the history of the early Christian Church. In its earliest years [he Church was regarded with some distrust, particularly during the first and second centuries. Christians conducted their worship in secret, giving rise to rumours of cannibalism (the 'body and blood of Christ' at the Eucharist) and orgies (the 'love feast' or 'Agape', which was a meal given as an act of charity by richer members of the Church).

All of this meant that Christians were blamed for anything that went wrong in society (because they had offended the gods!). One famous example is that of Emperor Nero when the city of Rome was burned down in a disastrous fire. He diverted the blame on to the Christians and persecuted many.

Throughout these early years there are many stories of Christians being persecuted. But what stands out most is the number who refused to give up their faith, despite the most hideous and painful torture used on them - despite even the prospect of martyrdom.


It is their example, their faith, that remains as their memorial.

It is very easy in our own day to feel that it doesn't matter whether we practise our faith or not. It is very easy to swim in the larger shoal of unbelievers, to pretend when everything in the garden is rosy that there is no need of God. But the faith that millions have died for, does not die. You may choose not to acknowledge it, but it is still there within you.

The Communists tried to eliminate it, yet it remained and now flourishes. Russia and China now have some of the fastest growing churches. The churches in South Africa and Uganda - just to take two more examples - are packed despite the troubles.

It is a fact that many turn back to God when trouble comes - a last plea for help perhaps! The early Christians faced persecution and isolation because of their beliefs, and yet many kept that faith. Why do so many today turn away from God? Is life too easy?

This All Saints-tide, look again at the Saints and look again at your faith. Let their example be a strength to you. Go on - "Follow the Saints"!
