PARISH COUNCIL NOVEMBER MEETING

Once again, the **police report** that the incidence of crime in Wrawby in October was low, with only 2 recorded crimes in the month. 9 other minor matters (road traffic incidents, suspected criminal damage etc,) were investigated. I make no apology for once again asking residents to remain vigilant and to report anything suspicious, however small. The police have recently been attaching importance to incidences of poaching/hare coursing and a recent conference involving many interested parties (landowners, CPS, Police officers, magistrates etc.)



proved very informative. Local vigilance immediately brought results in that a suspicious vehicle with dogs and men on board was seen by a landowner. The vehicle was eventually stopped and prosecutions ensued. The police have advised that incidents of poaching/hare coursing will always be fully investigated.

The ten-yearly **census** will take place on Sunday 27 March 2011. When the census forms arrive, it is vitally important, for future planning and funding activities, that everyone completes and returns them. There are jobs available to assist in the census. The website is: www.census.gov.uk and there is also a poster is on the village notice board, outside Wrawby Hall Care Home.

As previously advised, in the last 2 years the **village hall** has benefited from a complete new floor, a complete new heating system, new vandal proof windows, a complete new kitchen, substantially improved drainage and extensive car park works, including barrier work and complete lighting of the car park. It is felt that it is a "second to none" village facility. Some of the cost of all this work has come from excellent fund raising activities, with additional support from the Parish Council. The ceiling tiles at the hall are in poor condition, as a result of previous damp, and the Village Hall Committee has been looking at the possibility of completely renewing the ceiling. However, the estimates so far obtained indicate that it would cost between £5000 -£6000 which in these days of financial restrictions, the Council simply cannot afford. Discussions about cheaper options are ongoing and details will be advised. The Chairperson of the Village Hall Committee is Mrs Sue Day (tel.653699) and Sue also acts as the Booking Officer for the Hall. At the meeting on 2nd November, members of the Parish Council expressed their appreciation of the hard work Sue puts in for the village. Any assistance anyone can provide for Sue would be very much welcomed - please telephone either Sue or the Parish Clerk Graham Foster (651250) if you can help in any way.

PC Lynsey STAMP of the Neighbourhood policing team offers us some advice about dealing with Tradesmen and having a safer Christmas:

Often people are unsure of how to go about getting reputable tradespersons in to do household jobs.

- If you are insured contact your insurance company before commencing any repairs as they may have their own approved traders who will do the work for you.

- If you are arranging your own repairs always use traders who have been recommended or have reliable reputations

- Be wary of opportunist workmen who turn up unannounced and try to pressure you into paying for substandard or little work.

- Consider getting written quotes from at least 3 traders

- Consider making stage payments keeping back a significant part of money until the work is satisfactorily completed.

- Trading standards work alongside the Police to check the identity and authenticity of traders.

- The local council offices will be able to provide a list of vetted traders. This can be accessed via www.northlincs.gov.uk or on 01724 296296 or call in person to the main reception.

- If a trader is aggressive or you feel threatened you can call the Police on 0845 6060 222

- Further information and general guidance can also be found via www.consumerdirect.gov.uk

These simple winter tips are provided to help prevent you becoming a victim of crime over the festive period.

Safer when buying your Christmas Gift:

- Park your car in a well lit populated area—preferably a car park with security.
- Lock all doors and windows and use a steering lock
- Don't leave your car unattended with gifts or valuables on display

- Remove sat nav's and remove all circular marks from the windscreen. Thieves target vehicles with these marks in the hope of finding the sat nav in the glovebox.

- Use a bag which closes securely and do not put your wallet where everyone can see it.

Safer at Home over Christmas:

- Keep your home secured including windows and outside doors and if you have a burglar alarm make sure it is set

- Store your gifts out of sight until Christmas Day
- When going out use timer switches to turn your lights on
- Be a good neighbour and report anything suspicious in the area
- The best burglary deterrent is to make your home look occupied at all times.

Rene Rankin – R.I.P.

On 26th October the funeral of Mrs. Rene Rankin (aged 90) took place at St Mary's Church, attended by a large congregation. A tribute was paid by Rene's granddaughter, Kerri. Burial followed at Brigg cemetery.



Rene was born and brought up in Wrawby - the youngest of three brothers and four sisters, living in Barton Road and Tunnel Road. Her war service in the Women's Land Army was recently recognized by a national award, which she proudly received in Lincoln cathedral from the Lord Lieutenant, together with a letter from Prime Minister Gordon Brown. In 1943 she transferred to the NAAFI, and worked on several Lincolnshire bomber bases.



In 1947 Rene married Alex Rankin, formerly a Sergeant in R.E.M.E. After living first with her parents they moved to 9 Vicarage Gardens in 1954. Their son Stuart was born when Rene was 37 years of age, and she joined the group of younger mothers in the village. In her heyday she was keen on athletics, tennis and ladies' football. Later she was an energetic participant in Keep Fit and bowling. She was much involved in amateur dramatics in Brigg, both in the chorus and behind the scenes as vice-chairwoman of the entertainments' committee. She was also an active member of the Women's Institute. In recent years Rene often attended the Village Hall lunches.

In 1969 to 1979 she and Alex ran the 'White Horse' pub (now the 'Jolly Miller'), where many lively social events took place. On leaving there they moved temporarily to Barton-on-Humber, and then returned to Wrawby – to the same house as before. It was Rene's home for over 50 years.

After Stuart became a choirboy in the days of the Revd David Bates both parents followed him into St Mary's choir – a body of which Rene eventually became the sole survivor. Their church links became even closer when, in the days of Canon Ben Whitfield, Alex took on the role of verger with Rene assisting him in many ways. She continued as a PCC member until a few months before her death, when she moved to Wrawby Hall for residential care.

We give thanks for Rene's long and active life in this village, and for all that she did as a loving wife to Alex and as a caring mum / mother-in-law / grandma to Stuart, Carol and their daughters, Kerri and Keely. Many of us have memories of Rene's energy and zest for life, as well as her forthrightness and wicked sense of humour - a local 'character' who will be much missed. May she rest in Peace.

Immanuel – God is with us!

And that fills me with awe and wonder!

May you and yours be blessed this Christmas with the wonder and awe behind the nativity story – and may you know God's blessing of peace in the New Year

As the Church moves into the season of Advent, She marks the beginning of a new Christian Year. The word *Advent* comes from the Latin, for 'coming', so the season of Advent is about Christ's coming among us.



But Advent is more than simply looking forward four weeks to our celebration and remembrance of the Holy Nativity. We are urged to look forward to the Last Things. We call to mind Our Lord's promised return when He shall judge both the living and the dead. So as the Church begins a new year, we do so by looking forward to these Last Things – the day of judgement – rather than by looking back to the first – God's incarnation over two thousand years ago.

Before we are able to celebrate Christmas and fully enter into the mystery of Jesus' birth, we spend a short period of time reflecting on the Last Four Things in preparation for the end of time as a human construct, when all that God did for humanity as a result of that first Christmas will come to fruition. In His earthly life, Jesus taught us to look forward to the hour that we are called from this world, through death: death being the crowning point of every life, when we appear before Him to be judged.

The key point of Christmas, which many of us are preparing to celebrate, is the fact that God became human in order to help humanity become divine. He taught us to see our lives in His Divine perspective, to look forward to the day when he will come again, when the time of this world will cease. Then all will be united and perfected in His Kingdom, the Kingdom of Heaven, except for those who are lost and are therefore destined to hell.

As we get excited and look forward to the fun and joy of celebrating that first Christmas, let's prepare ourselves by reflecting of the Last Things: death, judgement, heaven and hell. We prepare ourselves for death and for eternal life, in order that 'we may be strengthened in hope, moved to thank God for His grace, and be inspired to deeper penitence and greater love.' (The Promise of His Glory, 1991; p. 103)

May all your preparations for the celebration of Christmas bring you comfort and peace, that you may share in the joy of Our Lord's Second Coming.
