Wrawby Pre-school is delighted to take receipt of its new building in the school grounds. The permanent brick structure marks the fruition of fundraising efforts of Wrawby Under-Fives Association, which has been generously supported by local residents for many years. The management committee would also like to express its thanks to North Lincolnshire Council.

Andrew Percy MP and the Parish Council, without whom the project would not have happened.

There will be an open afternoon from 3.30pm to 4.30pm on Monday 2nd February for anyone to pop in and have a look, followed by

an official opening at a date yet to be confirmed, when the outdoor area is completed. To coincide with the opening of the new building, the Pre-school is lowering its starting age to 2 years. Due to the level of demand for places, it will open five days a week from Monday 23rd February at the slightly extended hours



of 9am to 3.30pm.

The management committee is also currently considering the viability of an Out-of-School club in the new building, to run from 7.30am to 9am and 3.30pm to 5.30pm. If anyone has any good quality toys and games that would be



PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS – 6th January 2015 Broadband Speed

Council is aware that certain areas of Wrawby have been left out of faster broadband speed availability. This matter was the subject of lengthy debate at the above meeting and Council is doing all it can to resolve this problem.

Melton Ross Road Bridge

As residents are aware, there have been serious problems with strengthening this bridge – heavy goods vehicles cannot use the bridge and there has been a long-standing single file system there controlled by traffic lights. After lengthy consultation, the decision has now been made to 'shore up' the bridge sufficiently to allow heavy vehicles to use it, again in single file. Eventually a new traffic bridge will be installed – this will be extremely expensive and Central Government is to be approached with regard to possible finance.

Wrawby Under 5s Association

Again as residents are aware, Wrawby pre-school is currently having a new building constructed which is almost ready for handover. Wrawby Parish Council has agreed to assist the Association with the purchase of equipment for the new building to provide the children with suitable resources. Council expresses its appreciation for the substantial successful fund-raising efforts put in by the Association.


I wonder how many of your New Year resolutions have survived this far into the year, if they have the view is that they stand a good chance of success. Most of us look to the beginning of a new year to bring about change in our lives, we wish one another a happy and successful New Year, a prosperous and better one.

The church celebrates the beginning of February with a festival to mark a dramatic change in some peoples lives. February 2nd is Candlemas Day; traditionally called the Feast of The Purification of the Virgin Mary and later the Presentation of Christ in the Temple, it was a festival at which childbirth was venerated. Mothers who had borne children in the preceding year carried candles to church in thanksgiving. To-day a new baby into a family still marks an enormous change in that family's lives, in days long ago that change was even more dramatic.

But Candlemas Day also had another important function especially in agricultural areas, like this one, it was the day of the Candlemas Fair. It was at this fair that new engagements of agricultural labourers were entered into for the twelve months following the ensuing Lady Day (25th March) and those of the farming population who thought of changing their places duly attended the county town (such as Brigg) where the hiring fair was held. Thomas Hardy notes that in Victorian Dorset (and I suspect Lincolnshire was no different) "these annual migrations from farm to farm were on the increase the desire for yearly removal had risen to a high pitch."

Our desire to change things in our lives, and there are not many of us that don't fancy a change, seems to hark back to these former times – perhaps it's in our genes!! If you do make changes I hope that they are indeed successful.
