PARISH COUNCIL NEWS - June Meeting

1. Police Matters

The police advise that recorded crimes in April totalled only 2 - one common assault and one theft from a motor vehicle. Included in other occasions when the police were called were four incidents that aroused people's suspicions. The police are appreciative of being called to suspicious activities and continued vigilance is requested.

Since the report, the police have been investigating circumstances surrounding serious mouth and face injuries to a cat in the Bakersfield area of the village in May. Thankfully, after veterinary treatment and an operation, the cat is recovering well. The vet believes that its injuries were not the result of a road accident - anyone who has any information should ring 101 and ask for Brigg Police Station.

2. Information Board

Council is sure that residents will have noted the installation of the village interpretive board and stone opposite Vicarage Motors, close to the Church. Two members of the council, Kay Rothery and Louise Tandon have worked hard on this facility and council is appreciative of their efforts. Many compliments have been received from residents and all in all this project is considered to have been a success.

3. Flower beds

Residents will have noticed flower beds situated on various sites in the village. Again, Kay and Louise along with Bob Green, have been instrumental in organising these. Council paid for the preparation of the beds and purchased the plants, with financial help from North Lincs Council who allocated a fund to help Parishes improve their villages to celebrate the recent Queen's Diamond Jubilee. 4. Playing Field Play Area

The condition of the play area (swings etc.) adjacent to the playing field is giving cause for concern. The facility is subject to a yearly inspection which last year highlighted various shortcomings which are being addressed. As usual, the problem is one of funding. Paul Dalton (tel 654665) is dealing with this matter and council wishes to assist him in getting this area in good condition for childrens use as quickly as possible. Various funding options are being investigated and it is likely that a village fund raising effort will be undertaken in the near future. WRAWBY NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

During warm weather, please be aware that opportunist crooks will take advantage of insecure doors and windows, especially when purses, wallets, mobile phones, laptops and handbags may be on view and can easily be taken without being spotted whilst you are elsewhere in the house or out in the garden.

With this in mind, police are asking residents to remain vigilant and make sure your house is secure during the day and at night, even if you are at home. To help the local community reduce the risk of becoming a victim of crime, Humberside Police offer the following advice.

Ensure that homes are secure at all times and don't leave potential entry points open and accessible.

Whilst out working in the garden, perhaps with a loud mower or power tool, leaving windows or doors wide open is an invitation for an opportunist sneak thief to enter your property and steal your valuables. The same applies with regard to sheds and garages. It only takes a second to close a door or window.

On a warm day, there might be a temptation to leave your vehicle parked on the drive with its windows open to allow fresh air to circulate, but this makes it easy for someone to to take items from it or steal the vehicle.

In all these circumstances outlined, there is the potential to loose valuable property, have your house burgled, or loose your car. Please remember to help us to help you! These kinds of thefts are committed by opportunists who could be wandering around your neighbourhood looking to take advantage of people who leave their property insecure. Christian Aid Week Results

Wrawby people responded very generously to this year's Christian Aid week's appeal. A total of $\pounds 1,190.36$ was given, a fantastic result and a record for the village. Thank you all very much indeed. A further $\pounds 136.13$ was raised by the people who signed the gift aid form on the envelopes, which gets tax refunded back from the Government making a grand total of $\pounds 1,326.49$. An enormous thank you to the 24 people from the village who went round and collected and did a great job!

The money will help people in areas of poverty in the world. Christian Aid helps communities help themselves. For example, in some areas of extreme poverty by working through local partners Christian Aid provide simple tools, seeds, knowledge and expertise to the villagers so more food can be produced and their families fed. When this happens the health of people improves and less children die. It is not a quick fix, it takes several years. As life gets better often the thing people want most is a school for their children, and they work as a community towards building a school room for them.

In this way, amounts of money given by us to Christian Aid, make a difference to the lives of others. Thank you from them!

WOLD COURT WRAWBY

North Lincolnshire Homes has been carrying out an extensive review of the sheltered housing within its stock and as part of this review the remodelling of the existing Wold Court in Wrawby has been approved. This means the building will not be demolished. Work to draw up plans and designs for the scheme will commence in the very near future and they will include the following items of work.

Conversion of small bedsit flats into large 1 bed and 2 bed apartments

Installation of modern kitchens and other fitments

Level access and wet room showers

Modern heating, electrical and lighting

Refurbished communal areas with modern furniture, decor and facilities

External makeover with improved insulation

Environmental and access improvements

The installation of passenger lifts And much more

Once works are agreed and planning permission is in place, a contractor will be selected to carry out the works which are expected to take up to a year in total. Over the coming months the current residents will be re-homed either temporarily, or permanently if they wish, to allow the works to be completed. As yet it is difficult to say exactly when the work will commence but hopefully it will be towards the end of 2012. It is the aim of NLH to work with the local community through this process and ultimately provide a building that gives residents the comfort they need whilst complimenting the local surroundings.

Over the years, I have sat in meetings where the basic Christian Ethos was forgotten, and our own human nature prevailed. People pushing their own agendas, cliques forming, tempers getting heated, too much talk and not enough action. People assuming more authority or greater rights and responsibilities than they in fact had, thus creating friction with fellow committee members. And then there are those who resign and let everyone else down when things didn't go their way. Anyone who is involved in meetings will have witnessed these types of things.Often, at the heart of negativity in meetings, is the use of territory. People fighting their own corner and not seeing the bigger picture. "We want to do a project, but it's only for our members". "We want to put on an event, but only for the people of our community".

In December 2010 Bonby and Worlaby joined Brigg, Wrawby, Cadney and Howsham. Thankfully a fellow priest has been covering the Sunday services at Bonby and Worlaby, but he is retiring soon. A group of us, myself and one representative from each parish, have therefore begun to meet to discern the best way forward. As the first meeting progressed and we discussed the issues at hand, I was left feeling very humbled. Those who know me know I do not particularly like meetings – "minutes are taken, hours are lost". But the meeting with the representatives was fantastic. The Christian Ethos prevailed; love, charity and a concern for the common good of these five churches, their wider communities, and my own health, wellbeing and sanity were at the forefront of each person's mind. It was a privilege and a joy to chair the meeting.

The Church of England exists for the benefit of her non-members; it is the Parochial, rather than a congregational Church. But it is more than this; it is part of the holy catholic and apostolic Church – universal across time and space. Whilst we operate within the parish system, the parish is the smallest unit. St Mary the Virgin, Wrawby is not "a" Church; it is part of the Church, part of a group with Bonby, Worlaby, Brigg, Cadney and Howsham. Part of the Yarborough Deanery in the Diocese of Lincoln, in the province of Canterbury, in the Church of England in the universal Church of Christ.

It's only when congregations and PCCs look beyond the local, and beyond the territorial, remembering that we are part of a much bigger picture, that we can begin to do Gods work. Our Lord commanded those who would be Christians to go and make disciples of all the nations, and not to make ourselves cosy in our own little corner of the kingdom and regard ourselves as individual units. Being a Christian is a corporate calling. We live and function in community. When we do this, Churches begin to learn from each other, support each other, and grow together, and in the same way, so can the Church and society.

Wouldn't it be good if the Church universal began to look beyond its territory and worked more closely within society once again in order to re-establish the values of mutual respect, care for those beyond our group and concern for the common good of all humanity? The values that shaped the planning group meeting the other week are values that the Church and society should keep at the forefront of our minds, if not for the sake of God, then out of regard for our fellow humanity.
