How to Give a Cat a Pill

1. Pick up cat and cradle it in the crook of your left arm as if holding a baby. Position right forefinger and thumb on either side of cat's mouth and gently apply pressure to cheeks while holding pill in right hand. As cat opens mouth, pop pill into mouth. Allow cat to close mouth and swallow.
2. Retrieve pill from floor and cat from behind sofa. Cradle cat in left arm and repeat process.
3. Retrieve cat from bedroom, and throw soggy pill away.
4. Take new pill from foil wrap, cradle cat in left arm, holding rear paws tightly with left hand. Force jaws open and push pill to back of mouth with right forefinger. Hold mouth shut for a count of ten.
5. Retrieve pill from goldfish bowl and cat from top of wardrobe. Call spouse from garden.

7. Retrieve cat from curtain rail, get another pill from foil wrap. Make note to buy new ruler and repair curtains. Carefully sweep shattered figurines and vases from hearth and set to one side for gluing later.
8. Wrap cat in large towel and get spouse to lie on cat with head just visible from below armpit. Put pill in end of drinking straw, force mouth open with pencil and blow down drinking straw.
9. Check label to make sure pill not harmful to humans, drink 1 beer to take taste away. Apply Band-Aid to spouse's forearm and remove blood from carpet with cold water and soap.
10. Arrange for RSPCA to collect mutant cat from hell and call local pet shop to see if they have any hamsters.

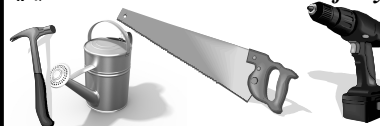

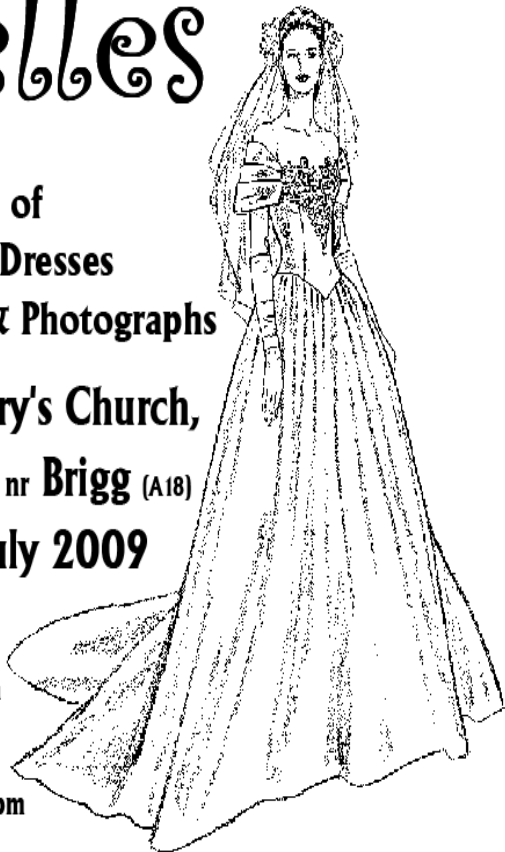

Parish Council News

The following subjects were discussed at the May meeting:

Police Report - Once again April was a relatively quiet month with little of note, though there was a report that a youth is taking milk from doorsteps after it has been delivered by the milkman - further information is required if this continues. The only other items logged in April were a theft from a motor vehicle, an incidence of criminal damage and an incidence of general rowdy behaviour on Vicarage Avenue. Once again, parishioners are asked to remain vigilant and safety conscious (lock doors, windows etc.) and to report anything suspicious, however minor. Parishioners should note that the Police Officer responsible for this area, PC Rob Armstrong, is holding a surgery for residents to discuss any police/crime matters at the Village Hall at 7pm on 2nd June 2009 (prior to the Parish Council meeting at 8pm).

Dog Control - North Lincs Council have produced a Dog Control Order which has been circulated to relevant Parish Councils. If anyone sees the Dog Control Order being broken (not clearing up etc.) they can telephone 01724 297000 or report online: northlincs.gov.uk/dogfouling. On the same subject, Wrawby Parish Council has agreed to fund the installation of a "Dog Bin" at the Barton Road/A18 junction and it is hoped that this will soon be in place.

Debt & Housing Advice Network (DHAN) N. Lincs - The Housing Advice Team at N Lincs Council has produced a directory of addresses/phone numbers for every organisation (utilities etc.) and a poster will shortly be going up in the village describing this. In the meantime, the Clerk (Graham Foster, tel. 651250) has a copy and if any parishioner has any problem, the network will help, so please telephone the clerk for details if necessary. The network is being run by the Housing Advice Team - tel. 01724 747655, Anita Hunt.

CE Electric UK - The above company supplies electricity to this area, through its company Yorkshire Electricity. The company maintains a 'priority' register of customers who may need help in the event of a power cut. Although there is already 170,000 homes registered, it is felt that there are more people in need of this service. Those registered get a dedicated priority telephone number and other priority treatment. CE Electric have produced a leaflet/application form and copies are available from 0800 6526543 (freephone).

NO ENTRIES DURING MAY

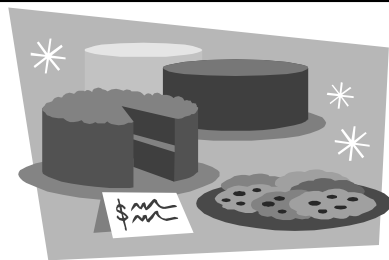

A front bench MP recently defined 'thrift' as 'getting value for money'. Sorry, but that's wrong! Thrift is always asking yourself whether you really need to spend that money in the first place. Ask anyone who lived through the aftermath of the Second World War. And ask anyone today who has lost their job!

Members of Parliament have got themselves into a real pickle recently over what they think they are entitled to spend under the heading of their 'Second Homes Allowance'. But I wonder whether the rest of us can afford to be particularly self-righteous in our criticisms.

Many of us seem to think that, if it is within the rules, we can do anything we like for our own advantage – and hang the consequences for anyone else. 'Do as you would be done by' has too often been replaced with 'Do down as you would expect to be done down by'.

In these weeks after Christian Aid week, we might remind ourselves that we are as wealthy as we are because we have been able to import cheap clothes and other goods – often produced by people who still live in grinding poverty. What's worse: The resources of our tiny planet are not infinite. So our children and grandchildren may be forced to learn about thrift the hard way in order to survive.

It's curious how over the years, our attitude to rules has changed. A generation ago, it was widely accepted that rules (and laws) were written down to illustrate broader principles of good conduct. It is as though there was an unspoken agreement that some ways of behaving were responsible and respectable, 'gentlemanly' and 'honourable' and some were not. Most people could be relied on to 'do the right thing' without having a law to enforce it.

More recently, though, people have got the idea that rules and laws are there as boundaries, within which any of us can do what we like. 'Pushing at the boundaries to see what we can get away with' becomes the name of the game.

In response governments have invented more and more complex laws and regulations that now seem to cover everything we might ever want to do. Consequently, if you now make the slightest mistake, however innocently, you are likely to be treated as a criminal.

So where do our ideas about what is honourable and responsible come from, if it is not from the law? Living responsibly and behaving honourably should surely make sense even when there's no law to enforce it.

Could the answer be something to do with the respect and compassion that we need to feel towards other people if we are to live in a healthy and peaceful society – especially when others have less clout than we have? Could it connect in some way with the Christian insight that healthy relationships between people are actually built not so much on laws limiting our selfishness but on a generous love that really cares for others?
