Parish Council - Annual Parish meeting

The Annual Parish Meeting will be held in the Village Hall on Tuesday 3rd March. This is the meeting at which Wrawby parishioners can question any councillor, as well as the Ward North Lincolnshire Councillors present, on any matter. The Public Meeting starts at 7.30pm in the Village Hall and will be followed by the regular monthly meeting which parishioners can also attend but only to observe the proceedings.

The following items were discussed at the February meeting.

Post Box

The possible installation of a new post box in Wrawby following the closure of the previous one at Central Stores was again mentioned - the Clerk has now heard from Royal Mail to the effect that they cannot justify replacing the box. Royal Mail states that there are already four boxes in Wrawby: Brigg Road, Melton Road, Wold Court and corner of Barton Road and Tunnel Road. These are considered by Royal Mail to be entirely adequate for the village.

The police report that January was once again a very quiet month in Wrawby with the only crime recorded being an assault on Melton Road for which an offender is being dealt with. Please remain vigilant and report any suspicions, however small, to the police.

The kingdom of heaven is like yeast that a woman took and mixed in with three measures of flour until all of it was leavened' (Mtt 13.33)

Just as yeast, when mixed with the other necessary ingredients required to make dough, results in fresh, tasty bread when it's baked, we are necessary to change the world. God calls each one of us to make a difference to the world in which we live.

Many things in the world are spoilt by humanities failings and mistakes, and the world is not how God intended it to be. Many of us have areas of concern that we are passionate about, and put a lot of our time and effort into changing. Issues such as abortion, the events in Gaza, homelessness in our own country. Some people buy Fairtrade products and seek to put an end to poverty and establish justice. Some are concerned with peace, others with racial equality. Animal rights, protecting the environment and saving endangered species are close to the hearts of some. I'm sure there are other issues I've not thought of here, which people find speak to their hearts, and stir their emotions, leading them to take action in some way – large or small.

As the Church journeys through the penitential season of Lent, Christians are called to say sorry to God for the ways we mar His image in us, and the ways we fail to love God with our whole beings, failing to love our neighbours as we ourselves would hope to be loved. We attempt to turn away from the bad habits we have formed in our lives, and try to become better people, more like the people God wants us to be. And one of the ways we express our attitude of repentance is by giving up something that we like very much, chocolate, meat, alcohol and so on.

Perhaps this year, rather than giving up something, you might consider taking on something. Think about what current events matter to you, it may be something on the list above, or you may have other things that concern you. Then think of some way you might be able to contribute to the work of that group during Lent. It may be an organisation with a local link, which you could offer to do voluntary work for. Or perhaps you might contribute to their work financially, by saving a small sum of money each day and donating it at Easter. But the most important way we can help is by prayer. Hold that charity, or need, or situation in prayer each day, and ask God to help alleviate the suffering of the world.

If each person who reads this article feels challenged to take on a new task during Lent, for just six short weeks, then perhaps we will be like the yeast which, when mixed in with flour, will cause changes and renewal in our world. Each little action is a contribution to the coming of God's kingdom here on earth as it is in heaven. By our response to God's call in our lives, we can change the world.
