Meanwhile, Nadia is giving others the chance of a fuller life by passing on her skills and her love of fashion to other young girls in her community.



For me it has been a very steep (but enjoyable) learning curve as I experience the many and varied parts of the curate's rôle, although Derek has yet to teach me the (bell) ropes.

One of the most enjoyable aspects of my work is to visit Wrawby school frequently for assemblies and other occasions. The staff and pupils there are fantastic and there is always a very friendly and happy atmosphere around the school. The same can also be said of Wold Court next door, where we have the privilege of doing a monthly Eucharist service. I also really enjoy Morning Prayer at St Mary's (Fridays at 9.15am if you're interested...), it's great to be able to meet up and pray over a cup of coffee and with toddlers happily playing around us.

St Mary's was also the venue for a Lent Youth Retreat, which brought together young people from the benefice and Barton for a day of reflection, socialise and strange flavoured crisps.
