It's the time of year again when many households in Lincolnshire will be getting their domestic oil deliveries for the winter. The Environment Agency is urging homeowners to check their oil tanks now as domestic heating oil can cause major problems if it leaks into the environment. It can pollute rivers, harm wildlife and contaminate the ground. It's not just the cost of losing the oil that can be expensive, clean up costs can be large and are not always covered by household insurance policies. ### PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

The Parish Council met on 6th September.

(a) Police Report

The reports for crime in the village during June and July continue to make encouraging reading. In June there were 4 crimes recorded, including a further attempted theft of lead from the Church roof. Thanks to the prompt action of a Wrawby resident, those committing this crime were caught in the act and are now facing charges. In July, there was only one recorded crime in Wrawby (a theft from a workshop). Although thankfully levels of crime in Wrawby remain relatively low, please remain vigilant and do not hesitate to report anything suspicious, however small. The police advise that there has been an increase in thefts of cable etc. in the area. Just one such theft can leave many houses without communication channels (phone, TV, broadband etc.) and so if anyone sees or has information on anyone committing this type of offence, please contact the Police on 084556060222 or crimestoppers anonymously on 0800555111. (b) Winter salting 2011/12.

Two members of the council recently attended a consultation exercise held by North Lincs Council to review the 2010/11 winter programme and to prepare for the 2011/12 winter programme. North Lincs took on board all the Parish Councils' individual comments and will do their best to include all these in the 2011/12 programme being prepared.

#### (c) <u>Interpretive board</u>

The Parish Council is at present looking into providing an interpretive board/lectern to be sited prominently in the village to guide visitors and to give a brief history of Wrawby. New and improved signage in the village (for the school, windmill, village hall etc.) is also being investigated. Council is looking for residents input - please contact any councillor (list on village website and notice board) with any comments/information. (d) Vacancy

#### Wrawby Crime Update for August
